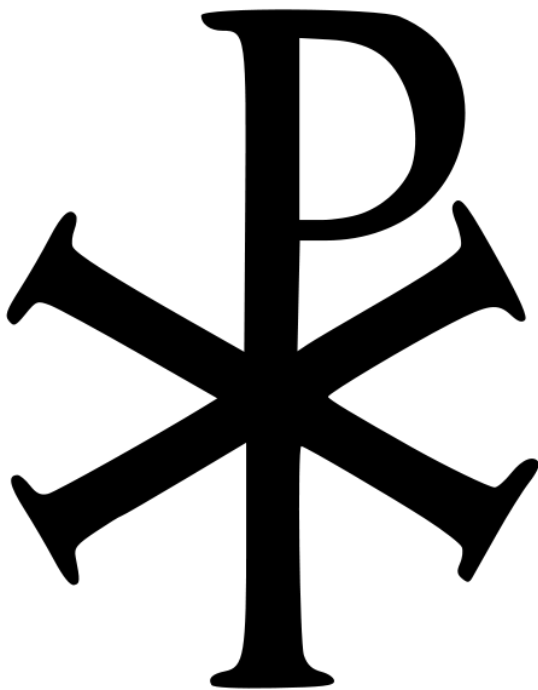

Welcome

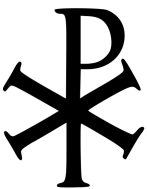
If you are **visiting** our church today, we welcome you to our worship service and Christian community. Please find the registration book in the foyer of the church and help us serve you better by leaving your name and contact information. We promise to keep this information confidential and only use it for personal contact with you and your family. Join us downstairs for coffee after this morning's service.

We have **Christian education** classes for all ages meeting after the service at 11:10 AM. Children's Sunday school classes meet in the educational wing. Pastor Meyers will be teaching on Martin Luther in the adult Sunday School Class this morning that meets in the Fellowship Hall. There will be no Evening Prayer Service tonight.

If you are unfamiliar with **our form of worship**, please feel free to speak with one of the Pastors or Elders. The **Lord's Supper** is observed every Sunday as the climax of covenant renewal worship. We invite to the Lord's Table all those who are baptized disciples of Jesus Christ, under the authority of Christ and his body, the Church. By eating the bread and wine with us as a visitor, you are acknowledging to the elders of this local church that you are in covenant with God as an active member of a congregation in which the Gospel is faithfully confessed, taught, and believed. If you have any doubt about your participation, please speak to one of the elders or the pastor before or after the service. **Note:** The middle circle of cups in each tray contains grape juice, the larger outer ring contains wine (the grape juice has a darker color than the wine).

The Chi Rho (*Front Cover*)



The Chi-Rho is the oldest known monogram of Jesus Christ. It is sometimes known as a "Christogram". The *chi* and the *rho* are the first two letters of the word Christ (*Christos*) in the Greek language. The *chi* (Χ) = ch and the *rho* (Ρ) = r. The Greek word *christos* translates the Hebrew word for "Messiah," which means "anointed one." Jesus was born to be the promised anointed Priest and King.

Today our Pulpit and Table paraments are **green**. The traditional color for Trinity Season is green, which symbolizes life and growth, both for the church and our own individual Christian lives.

The Lord's Service Explained

The Experience of the Lord's Supper (Part 1)

I've been involved with liturgical reformation in our circles for more than two decades. And I've been encouraged by the number of churches—established and newly planted—that have moved to weekly communion. Unfortunately, I have also learned that some churches that moved to a weekly Supper, after a few months or so, have returned to monthly, even quarterly communion. And I am convinced that in many cases (maybe most cases) the reason is that the Supper is too often experienced in the wrong manner. When communion is experienced as an intensive time of introspective mourning for and confession of sin, then having a somber, funereal ritual disguised as a meal *every* week is not very pleasant.

Remember, the Supper is a feast, a joyful banquet where we dine with our risen Lord Jesus and with one another. In a normal Christian liturgy, we have already confessed our sins and received forgiveness early on in the service. We have heard the Lord's gracious instruction in the reading of Scripture and through the preaching of the pastor. We come to the end of the service and before we are sent out the Lord invites us to sit down, relax, and enjoy his presence and each other's friendship and love ritually embodied in a covenant meal. Tasty bread and good wine given by the Lord to his people and shared with one another. It ought to be a happy occasion. It's not a time for mourning or introspective confession of sin.

Is there anything in the Bible, either Old or New Testaments, to suggest that covenant memorial meals are not to be experienced with joy and exuberance? There is a time and place to fast and mourn, a time for deep repentance and tears. But normally that is *not* what happens at *meals*. It might happen before the meal, but this kind of dour demeanor and posture at the Lord's Supper is oppressive and counterproductive. Don't we also call this sacrament a "eucharistic meal"? When we recall that "eucharist" means "give thanks," shouldn't we then expect the mood at the Table to be thankfulness and gratitude? The end of all of human history is the triumphant Marriage Supper of the Lamb, the eschatological wedding feast. Therefore, shouldn't the culmination of our divine services also be a joyful ritual banquet? The very presence of wine at the Table means that we are celebrating and should be jubilant and cheerful. We don't gather at Christ's *tomb* but at his *Table*.
